A group of British boys are stranded on an uninhabited island. They attempt to govern themselves, with disastrous results.



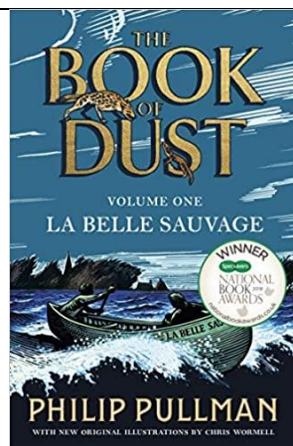

This is a gripping fusion of familiar fairy tales told in a dark-hearted version, with spell-binding illustrations by Chris Riddell.



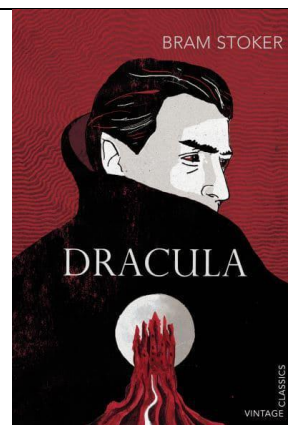
Racism/Relationships
