




Skellig by David Almond




My Family And Other Animals by Gerald Durrell

Illegal by Eoin Colfer A powerfully moving, award-winning graphic novel that explores the current plight of undocumented


immigrants from New York Times bestselling author Eoin Colfer and the team behind the Artemis Fowl graphic novels.

The Goldfish Boy by Lisa Thompson



The Wolves Of Willoughby Chase by Joan Aiken



The Book Thief by Marcus Zusak



Classic/Dystopian


Animal Farm by George Orwell

World politics




The Hunger Games by Suzanne Collins

Room 13 by Robert Swindells



I Capture The Castle, Dodie Smith



She Wolf by Dan Smith



Midwinterblood by Marcus Sedgwick







Wormwood by G. P. Taylor



Toffee by Sarah Crossan


An insightful and compassionate free verse novel, exploring the transformative relationship between a runaway teenager and an elderly lady with dementia.

The Diary of A Young Girl by Anne Frank



Home Ground by Alan Gibbons







Everything You Need To Ace Computer Science And Coding



Smart by Kim Slater



All The Money In The World by Sarah Moore Fitzgerald


