In the chaos of the First World War, one horse witnesses the reality of battle from both sides of the trenches.




## The Lies We Tell Ourselves by Robin Talley


**Fantasy**

# Ghost Boys by Jewell **Parker Rhodes**



As a ghost, Jerome begins to notice other ghost boys. Each boy has a story and they all have something in common...







## **Noughts and Crosses** by Malorie Blackman


